
The Adopt-a-Species program was developed to increase student awareness and understanding of Montana's wildlife and the need for habitat stewardship. Students have learned, through study of their own special Montana wildlife species, the value of wildlife and the importance of providing a healthy habitat—food, water, shelter and space.


This year, students were again requested to spend time researching their Adopt-a-Species, always with a focus on habitat. They are encouraged to participate in the yearly Adopt-a-Species art contest. Since the outreach for Adopt-a-Species is an insert in the Independent Record, having students create classified ads for their critter seemed like a creative way for them to portray and identify key habits, traits and habitat for their species. We asked the teachers to have their students read the classifieds in newspapers and magazines and let them "go wild." They could illustrate Unfurnished Houses, Want to Own, Landscaping and more. The options were endless.

The Adopt-a-Species partners were a little worried that going outside the norm would limit responses but were very pleasantly surprised when we ended up with more entries from a greater variety of schools than we have had in recent years. The students certainly understood the concept and we received entries from future copy writers, outstanding sales people and "artistes." We hope you enjoy their creativity!

The younger students (k-2) grades were only asked to portray their species in its habitat so some of those entries won't always have an accompanying ad. We may have art from one student and an ad written from another which is noted.



Pond Life


